## **Public Presentations**

The season for 4-H Public Presentations and Horse Communications is coming soon. Generally youth will decide on topics and begin gathering information to construct the body of their presentation starting in January. After weeks of building a presentation the youth will start working on visual aids and props to enhance their presentation by designing and assembling posters and materials. Clubs are encouraged to ask their members to participate in public speaking at the club level with family and other 4-H members. If they wish, youth can present at the County level event which is commonly held in February or March. From the County level youth can be chosen to continue on to the District level event held in April. Participants who qualified could be asked to move on to the state completion. St. Lawrence County has sent many 4-H'ers over the years to the State completion, which has been hosted at Cornell University for the past few years. ## **4-H Robotics**

2015 was the first full year of official STEM programming for 4-H. We were able to pilot a robotics program in several formats and present a plethora of hands-on science opportunities for various events. Most recently we had a small biology lab program and will trying out a dissection lab in December. Lego robotics provided over 30 youth the opportunity to develop basic coding, problem solving and engineering skills. Our first ever program used incomplete kits which meant that youth needed to think outside the box in order to finish building their robots. They were very successful! The visual coding program included with the kits assisted the kids in learning to code. The entire process encouraged teamwork to complete and program the robots. As 4-H robotics continues to grow in St. Lawrence county we are looking for parents and community members who may be interested in starting a robotics 4-H club.

In addition to Lego robotics kids from St. Lawrence County have tried hands-on experiments with color absorption, the proteins in milk, the chemistry of baking bread, growing bacteria, synthetic blood typing, and the effects of acid rain, how bleach works (redox reactions) and several other topics.

Youth in grades 4-7 at Herman-DeKalb Extended Day Afterschool started the year with an introduction to computer hardware and programming in Python. In addition they applied the scientific method to develop, test and compare paper airplane designs. They also explored basic physics principles like force and motion with toy cars and clay people by testing, for example, the effects of added weight on distance traveled.

STEM programming in St. Lawrence County is continually being re-evaluated to create the most effective programming model. In 2016 there will be a theme each month with one session each week or every other week, depending on interest. Clubs and individuals may sign up for a session or request an additional session. The themes each month will be posted to the STEM webpage and listed in the next newsletter
