- 10 hours of Community Service
- 3 Educational Events

Gold Certificate (8 Years of Age & Up):

- 3 Projects
- 15 hours of Community Service
- 4 Educational Events

Emerald Certificate (13 Years of Age & Up):

- 4 Projects
- 15 hours of Community Service
- 4 Educational Events
- 2 Leadership Projects (with at least one being the primary leader of a club project)

Ruby Certificate (13 Years of Age & Up):

- 3 Projects
- 15 hours of Community Service
- 4 Educational Events
- Lead a 4-H Project with **another** 4-H Club or organization
- 1 additional leadership project
- Promote 4-H Club throughout St. Lawrence County

Pearl Certificate (16 Years of Age & Up):

- 3 projects
- 10 hours of Community Service
- 2 Educational Events
- Lead a 4-H Project with **another** 4-H Club or organization
- Developed a program or educational resource that will carry on or continue to be used in the future.
- Promote 4-H Club throughout St. Lawrence County

Diamond Certificate (16 Years of Age & Up):

- 3 projects
- 10 hours of Community Service

- 2 Educational Events
- Lead a 4-H Project with another 4-H Club or outside organizations
- Plan, promote, and implement a significant countywide community service project, in which other 4-H clubs or outside organizations would participate
- Promote the 4-H Club Program throughout St. Lawrence County
- Submit a proposed plan of work to the 4-H Youth Development Program no later than June of the 4-H year.

Relevant Definitions:

4-H Age: Your age as of January 1st of the 4-H year.

4-H Project: A unit of work, which may consist of a series of learning experiences, designed to help shape the character of 4-H youth and teach lifelong skills. You may request the 4-H Project List from the office to see examples available.

4-H Cloverbud Project: Similar to a 4-H project, however it is usually a short-term experience emphasizing socialization and involvement.

4-H Educational Event: An event that provides an added and unique educational experience. Examples include, but are not limited to the following:

4-H Community Service: Providing assistance that benefits someone outside of the member's family and club.

4-H Leadership Project: Providing direction and guidance to others. Examples include, but are not limited to the following:

Serving as a Teen Evaluator at an Educational Event

Serving as a Teen Assistant/Leader/Superintendent at an Educational Event

Serving as an Officer in a 4-H Club or Teen Council

Leading a project within their 4-H Club or another 4-H Club

Assisting another project leader within their 4-H Club

Serving on a Cooperative Extension Advisory Committee

Serving as a 4-H Camp Overlook Counselor

4-H Promotion: Promote the names, mission, and ideals of the 4-H program by informing the community through advertising or publicity:

Lead the planning and operation of County Fair Club Booth or Activity booth

Write articles for Extension News and/or the public newspaper

Organize a booth, float, or group for Dairy Princess Parade

Plan and implement a Community Service project that educates the public about the 4-H program
